Cahokia: A Pre Columbian American City

located at the Cahokia site in Illinois (Courtesy of Wikipedia Commons) Almost a thousand years ago, American Indians built a city along the Mississippi River in the middle of North America Located opposite modern-day St Louis, Missouri, this city is called Cahokia by archaeologists, and it was as large in its day as New York

At its peak about 1150 CE, Cahokia was an urban settlement with 20,000-30,000 people; this population was not exceeded by North American European settlements until after 1800 Some effigy mounds were constructed in the shapes or outlines of culturally significant animals
